CARRON VALLEY HOSTS BIKEFEST

The first part of a £1.5 million project to re-vamp the Carron Valley Forest launches on Saturday 12th May.

The BikeFest, at Carron Valley near Kilsyth will mark the opening of three new sections of mountain bike trail, each 1.2km long, and showcase future plans for the venue.

The proposed £1.5 million project will upgrade recreational facilities in the Carron Valley Forest for mountain bikers, walkers and other forest users.

Mountain bikers of all ages and abilities are invited to try the popular mountain bike trail network and enjoy a host of activities on 12th May.

Riders will be able to recharge with a Red Bull at the rider energy station,or relax with a hand-crafted real ale from the local Tryst brewery. A unique outdoor cinema will showcase the latest mountain bike (MTB?) films courtesy of Chilli Video and exhibitors including Endura, Alpine bikes and Scottoiler will ensure there are bargains at the trade stalls. A prize raffle will be drawn throughout the day too.

David Russell, Carron Valley Development Group Secretary said,

"We are very excited to be launching our new trail sections and showcasing our plans with this unique event and hope it will make mountain bikers in Central Scotland and beyond aware of what Carron Valley has to offer."

"In addition to enjoying some of the most popular trails in Scotland, riders can see the plans for the venue and have their say on the future of the development whilst enjoying great food, drink and entertainment in a relaxed, informal atmosphere."

"We hope everyone from families with small children to hard-core mountain bikers will take their pick of the cycle trails and become regular visitors to this beautiful forest located in the heart of Central Scotland."

Simon Rennie, chief executive of the Central Scotland Forest Trust (CSFT), a partner in the redevelopment of Carron Valley is urging locals to come along and try out the new facilities. He said: "The addition of the mountain bike trail will hopefully boost visitors to this part of the forest and get people out in the fresh air.

"The mountain bike trail has been recognised as one of the best trails in Scotland* which is a great boost to the facility and the 12th should be a great day out for all."

The forest lies in the heart of Central Scotland between Kilsyth, Stirling and Denny. With most major cities in Scotland within 1 hours drive and nearby public transport links in Kilsyth and Stirling, the Carron Valley mountain bike trails offer big country biking in a convenient location.

Since the launch in spring 2006, Central Scotland's first purpose built mountain bike centre is proving extremely popular with riders of all ages and abilities. Almost 11km of trails have been created by volunteers from the Carron Valley Development Group (CVDG) working with the Carron Valley Partnership comprising Central Scotland Forest Trust, North Lanarkshire Council, Stirling Council, Scotlish Water, The Clanranald Trust and Forestry Commission Scotland.
